Shalini Ganendra Fine Art celebrates Asia Week New York presenting three award winning artists with accompanying curatorial talks and salon events, at the Louis K. Meisel Gallery.

The 2016 show features works by Asian award winners: ZAC LEE (Malaysia), QUANG PHAN (Vietnam) and ENRICO ISAMU ŌYAMA (Japan/Italy).

The exhibition celebrates original explorations of culturally relevant themes, in a contemporary and global context.

Zac Lee's continuing commentary on the geopolitical challenges in SE Asia and Malaysia in particular, takes shape in code with traditional iconography - cat, mouse, tiger and canine. Quang Phan unveils his new photographic series, *Hidden Love*, developed over 5 years (with support from the Asian Cultural Council), that visually records current contexts of some Japanese occupation wartime comfort women. He has researched and travelled through SE Asia to capture these elegantly haunting images. Enrico Isamu Oyama shows large canvas works of his style of *Quick Turn Structure*, balancing the aesthetics of contemporary art and street culture.

We look forward to sharing with you these regional narratives and distinctive aesthetics.

### **ZAC LEE**

Zac Lee's fluid strokes study sublime behaviors and relationships, presenting "trace evidence" of cultural, societal and personal instincts and interactions. Objects and forms are metaphors for the individuals and the community, often showing contemporary applications of traditional folklore and national iconography.

With strong training in Chinese brush and traditional painting genres, Lee embraces experimentation in his growing contemporary practice, that includes painting, photography, silk screen and digital mediums. He continues to engage with realism, abstraction, language and illustration, to present aesthetically impactful works that explore psychological puzzles whilst also making elegant social commentary.





## PHAN QUANG

Quang's project "Hidden Love" investigates the impact of World War II on the people of Vietnam, Thailand, Philippines, Malaysia, Korea, Taiwan, Hong Kong and China. Due to the age of the subjects, there was immense pressure to complete the project in a timely manner; their living accounts were imperative to exposing the love held and lost by the war. The works traces the lives of select women of this time.

Through "Hidden Love", Quang demonstrates that when war occurs in a country, its citizens are the victims. They have no control over a war that they do not want. The government and political regimes cannot predict the impact and consequences. Despite having ended 70 years ago, the consequences of this World War II are still being felt.

War changes physical and psychological borders, in addition to challenging civilian rights. Quang looks away from the death and destruction of war, and turns to love - the love between wife and husband, father and son and generational bloodlines. The project aims to expose the long felt suffering of war and the salve of love that moves victims forward.

## ENRICO ISAMU ŌYAMA

Born in 1983 to a German-Italian father and a Japanese mother, Ōyama grew up in Japan visiting Northern Italy every summer for more than 2 decades. The to and fro, experiencing Tokyo as megalopolis and Northern Italy as quiet countryside, trained him to view the world from different angles.

Ōyama's signature, monochromatic, minimal, spontaneous style is heavily informed by the visual language of graffiti culture. Completing an MFA at Tokyo University of the Arts enabled him carefully balance this "Quick Turn Structure" between contemporary art and street culture.

He has collaborated with brands such as COMME des GARÇONS and Shu Uemura. He has also published a book, *Against Literacy: On Graffiti Culture* with LIXIL Publishing.

He is a recipient of an Asian Cultural Council grant and received an Honorable Mention Award at VOCA 2016 Exhibition at the Ueno Royal Museum, Japan.
